July 2016 – for Vice-County Recorders in Wales

Atlas 2020 coverage and dataflow to the DDb

There are now over 2 million records from Wales on the DDB, more than 1 million of which are since 2000, and 93,000 for 2015. As at the beginning of July there were over 9000 2016 records. This is great as it enables anyone in the BSBI to see the progress we've made in Wales. I am hoping to work with the remaining counties to get more up-to-date records by the end of 2016.

For the 2000+ date classes there are currently 145,000 "smarties" – that is 10k dots on the map, unique hectad-taxon combinations, compared with 165,000 for 1987-1999. I am sure when the remaining counties upload data, and with an additional four recording seasons to go, we will exceed the previous coverage by a considerable margin. This is the only comparable measure; in fact we are recording at much more detail, with no records at less than 2km resolution, and our tetrad coverage will be unprecedented.

Recorders' workshops/ training

We had a second MapMate workshop at Coed y Brenin which was attended by some of the Merioneth recorders and Hugh Knott from Anglesey. I think it was useful to the attendees.

Chris Metherell came to Treborth (Bangor) in March to lead a pair of workshops on *Euphrasia* for beginners and improvers. These were very useful and left the beginners itching for summer to get out and identify some *Euphrasias* in the field.

There will be another Recorders' Conference in September in Shrewsbury, which I'm sure will be a very valuable weekend. The theme is Hybrids and Allies: recording and surveying, and there will be a talk from Clive Stace among others, as well as workshops on charophytes, conifers, euphrasias and more! The *Dryopteris* workshop in October with Fred Rumsey is now fully booked, and sounds like it should be a great weekend. We'll hope to repeat it next year, to give some of the people who haven't been able to attend this time.

Rare Plant Monitoring

After a slow start (due to starting the job at the end of August – hardly time to plan anything for the field season) I am now getting to grips with the rare plant monitoring part of the project. I feel that I am finally getting some really useful contacts with NRW staff who are interested in us looking at some SSSI features, and the TPP forms for this year are beginning to stack up – thanks to everyone who has filled in one (or more!). The species I am most interested in remain *Trollius europaeus, Antennaria dioica, Vicia orobus* and *Hammarbya paludosa*, but any species that are features of SSSIs, or even if they are off SSSIs, but rare (listed in Red Book or Section 42) would be welcome. I am of course passing copies of these forms to the relevant VCRs, but the aim will be that they will be available to NRW staff via GIS. I think it's useful to understand that these forms are one of the "deliverables" for the grant that funds my position, and so anyone helping by filling them in allows me to continue to support VCRs in whichever ways they prefer.

Meetings 2016

I have spent a couple of days at Glynhir, then the Welsh AGM, and Caerdeon – with family in tow! I gather the grasses workshop was a success thanks to Julian (unfortunately Arthur Copping was injured and unable to lead it in the end). I haven't managed to get to as many local meetings as I hope, but I do keep hearing of new records. Perhaps the best so far is *Hammarbya* found during the Caerdeon weekend – first county record since 1975, and first for the 10k square since 1935.



Wales Biodiversity Partnership - Vice-County Recorder book fund

Four counties already have a link to a pdf of their Rare Plant Register, and I would love more to be available.
