## The survey

- This will be the third national distribution Atlas produced by the BSBI, involving systematic recording by volunteers across the whole of Britain and Ireland. Fieldwork began in 2000 and will be completed by the end of 2019
- Lists of plant species are collected at 2 x 2 km (tetrad) precision or better for all of the 3,877 10 x 10 km (hectad) squares within the survey area
- BSBI volunteers have collected many millions of records since 2000, but there are plenty of locations where help is still required before the end of the project



## The outputs

Once fieldwork is completed, we will be able to:

- Analyse and interpret changes to our flora using the distribution data collected allied to environmental data such as water quality, air quality and plant traits
- Update distribution maps for native and introduced species with detailed maps available as an online resource
- Publish the results and provide robust and up-to-date information to assist the conservation of rare, scarce and threatened species
