### Atlas 2020 Plugging the Gaps

Right for a bit of fun, I'd like **everyone** to work out the grid reference of the hectad (10 x 10km square) you live in, and enter it in the [BSBI DDb Grid Ref Lookup Tool](#). (No need to login). Then click the "View detailed taxon list for..." and check "sort recent records recently". You may also have to select the Vice-county you live in if the hectad intersects more than one.

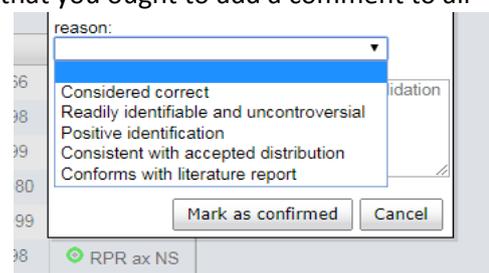
Now look carefully at the list of species in faint (as opposed to bold) at the top that have not been seen since 2000. The date after the species indicates the date of the most recent record and first number after that indicates the number of 1987-1999 records. You might be surprised to find some relatively common species listed. Whenever you are out and about in your home hectad(s) look out for these species and record any you re-find. Or if you are aware of populations of some of the less common species on the list locally – go and re-record them!

Then, of course, email your County Recorder the records. If you get very enthusiastic and have lots of records to forward from local hectads, you should enter them into a spreadsheet before forwarding to the County Recorder. ### Atlas 2020 Validation: Commenting on your Validations

In recent months, I've included a series of articles in BSBI eNews about validating records as soon as County Recorders have entered and uploaded them to the DDb. Following on from last month's piece on confirmed records when I said "select all the records for the period tested, click the down arrow in the box prefixed by 'mark validation state' and select 'confirmed'. Finally apply the change to selected records. It is that easy!" I should have gone on to mention that you ought to add a comment to all validations, typically using the drop-down list, see right.

If they are your own records or from a very trustworthy recorder you can use 'Positive identification'. For most other records, use 'Considered correct'. Do consider the different reliabilities of different recorders / species ID difficulty.



Do not confirm records over which there is any doubt. There is an option to mark records as 'Needs checking' which removes them from maps but they are still returned by default queries - handy until you have made up your mind whether to accept or reject a record.

## Atlas 2020 Validation: Spotting grid reference errors



When checking recently added records it is really useful to use the DDb's zoomable maps option to spot grid reference errors. Here is an example of why: Some records of mine from a recent recording day, along the A9 cycle path at the Slochd. I am very careful when entering grid refs, always double checking, but the circled group of records were entered as NH828253 whereas they should have been NH838253. The grid ref in my notebook was correct, just entered into MM incorrectly.

## Moving Memory Map to a new computer

Last month I included a piece on Moving MapMate to a new computer. I know many of you also use Memory Map, and I am occasionally asked about how to move it to a new machine.

To do so, first check that you have the latest version of Memory Map on your old computer by clicking Web > Check for updates... and update it, if necessary, following the instructions. (This is a crucially important step.) Then open it and make sure it works OK. Install the latest version of Memory Map on your new computer – available from the [Memory Map website](#), and with Memory Map closed, copy the 'Map Overlays' folder from your old computer's Documents folder and completely replace 'Map Overlays' in your new machine's Documents folder. Then copy your 'Maps\_v5' folder from your old machine to the new one, and reconnect Memory Map with its maps by clicking Map > Map List > Refresh Map List and navigating to the new 'Maps\_v5' location and clicking OK.

Finally, you will need to migrate your Memory Map licences to the new computer. On your new machine, click Help > Licence Management and sign in and make the appropriate changes.

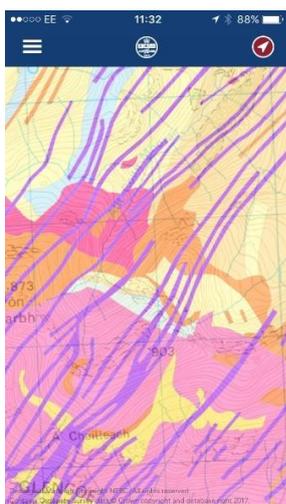

## *Sparganium erectum* (Branched Bur-reed) subspecies

I would like to encourage recording of *Sparganium erectum* subspecies. The subspecies are variously over or under recorded. It would be great to get a better picture of their true distribution for [Atlas 2020](#). Please send me mature fruits (which should be ripe now or, if not, shortly) peeled off and put in paper packets with details, only one head per packet, so as not to mix plants up. Please send material to my address at 43 Roundwood Glen, Greengates, Bradford BD10 OHW along with your email address so I can feedback easily to you. Alternatively, if you have problems sending material in the post try sending a good photograph of a group of the mature fruits, peeled off, flat on a sheet. There will be a fuller note in the imminent BSBI News.

## The British Geological Survey iGeology App



I have the free [BGS iGeology app](#) on my smartphone. It shows your position on a detailed geological map superimposed on a faint 1:50,000 OS map. If you tap anywhere on the map a window pops up which explains what the superficial and bedrock geology is at that precise point. You can even access geological maps with no network connection, by navigating to the area before heading out into the field and the app caches the maps.

I put the app to test recently by using it to successfully refind a very localised and remote outcrop of limestone high up in the hills north of Glencoe where I'd seen *Dryas octopetala* (Mountain Avens) 30 years previously. I also renewed a 52 year-old record for *Equisetum variegatum* (Variegated horsetail) and also found *Carex capillaris* (Hair sedge) at the same location. The limestone (always in blue) wasn't precisely where the app indicated but it was close enough.

Over much of Scotland (and I suspect elsewhere), the geology is pretty dull and it is useful to search for outcropping limestone or other base-rich bedrock and geological dykes, as they often offer the best chance of finding interesting species in an otherwise species poor landscape.

## Irish grid reference system is changing – what does it mean for BSBI recorders?

The grid reference system in use in both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland is (gradually) changing to the **IRISH TRANSVERSE MERCATOR (ITM)**. There is more about the change [here](#). However, the BSBI will continue to use the older system, the **IRISH GRID (or IG)**, for all recording and mapping, and recorders are advised to continue to use it.

Tom Humphrey, BSBI's Database Officer, writes "The BSBI's gridded distribution mapping will continue to use Irish Grid squares. All grid-based surveys that are intended to contribute to BSBI atlases or Floras should therefore continue to use the Irish Grid. Occurrences expressed as centroids can use either grid system, although Irish Grid remains our preferred system. Centroid records that are already in ITM format should not be converted before being sent to the BSBI's Database."

The problem is that while point grid references can be converted from one system to another reasonably accurately, the conversion doesn't work so well for grid references that describe larger squares (e.g. 1km, 2km or 10km squares). Recorders who work in consultancy should take particular care that their GPSs are always set to IG when recording for BSBI.

Key message for everyone – keep recording using Irish Grid as before!

John tells us that 2,620 copies of the eBook were downloaded during the promotion and it was seen by many more people via social media – see below under 'BSBI News & Views'!

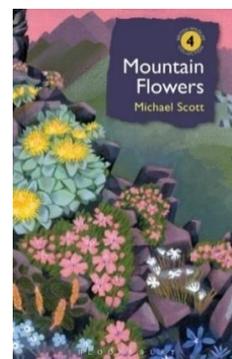
