## Trichophorum x foersteri & Juncus compressus

After last month's piece on *Trichophorum*, I had a note from Mike Wilcox, saying that the hybrid does indeed occur on the Isle of Man (despite no record of it on the DDb). He goes on "It was first collected there by B.A. Tregale from the track leading up Snaefell in c. 2011 and found again in a different location in 2013". Specimens from both sites were determined by Mike who goes on to say, "*T. cespitosum* is yet to be found or maybe/probably extinct there. It would be worth looking at other sites on the Isle of Man with *Trichophorum* at least for the hybrid and this year's Annual Summer Meeting would be a good chance to look and collect vouchers."

He also adds, following the article on *Juncus compressus*: "I would be happy to look at vouchers of *Juncus compressus*. Any claim of it being on saltmarshes is not true in my opinion. When *gerardii* is fruiting it superficially looks like *compressus* but the anther/filament and seed size are diagnostic. Both can be inland of course."

## **Invasive plant species**

The European Union has placed some of the worst offenders a list of <u>invasive alien species of concern</u> but which ones do the government agencies really need to know about?

- Gunnera tinctoria (Giant-rhubarb),
- Hydrocotyle ranunculoides (Floating Pennywort),
- Ludwigia grandiflora (Water-primrose),
- Lysichiton americanus (American Skunk-cabbage),
- Myriophyllum aquaticum (Parrot's-feather) and
- Myriophyllum heterophyllum (Various-leaved Water-milfoil).

There are species alerts for Water-primrose and Various-leaved Water-milfoil. Please report sightings urgently, so that they can be eradicated quickly.

In Scotland, Floating Pennywort and Parrot's-feather are being eradicated, thanks to BSBI records, and we plan to tackle Giant-rhubarb in the future and your records of American Skunk-cabbage may help protect vulnerable habitats from invasion.

Records of other <u>high-impact alien plants</u> will help with Water Framework Directive monitoring. Not all sightings will be priorities for control but your records will help to build our knowledge and to prioritise future action. <u>More...</u>

# Atlas 2020 Data Entry

With the recording season upon us, now would be the ideal time to get into the habit of keeping on top of record entry, regularly submitting those records to the DDb and validating them as soon as they arrive. Here are six useful tips for MapMate users.

#### Atlas 2020 Validation

Tom Humphrey has added a new 'Do not map' validation option to the DDb. This option was created to deal with records of plants that are probably cultivated in a non-wild situation, e.g. within a garden, and that should not be included on maps intended to show the wild distribution. The default is 'include on maps'. This option will probably only be used occasionally by Recorders but is a useful addition to the validation options. More...

## **Field Meetings**

There were workshops for beginners/improvers on horsetails, on the DDb for the recorders, and a guided tour of the magnificent Great Palm House by Gardens Director Matthew Jebb. It was a packed schedule!

We had hoped that people would take the opportunity nonetheless to catch up, chat about progress and ideas and issues, to meet new people, etc. – and if the deafening cacophony at coffee times was anything to go by, then this was definitely achieved! **Updated Atlas 2020 coverage maps:** Andy recently updated the tetrad scale VC coverage maps and the Country Officers sent Recorders a link to them. If you bookmark the link you will be able to return to it at any time easily and see future updates whenever they are available. We hope the updated maps will be useful for planning your final two Atlas 2020 field seasons.

<u>Cucaera Online maps</u>: have just been updated and now include geological information as well as VC boundaries. They can be viewed against 1:50,000, 1:25,000 or old OS maps for the whole of GB and the Isle of Man. If you search for a particular grid reference, it will return nearest placename, postcode, altitude, geology – as well as the Vice-County. Add a bookmark to your bookmark bar by clicking the star in the top right-hand corner of your browser.
