# **Data Entry Spreadsheets**

Recorders, if you have local members who regularly contribute records on recording cards, or in spreadsheets, encourage them to use a new spreadsheet which Phill Brown, joint Recorder for Westmorland & Cumberland, has cunningly developed. With the new spreadsheet, once the site / grid ref / VC/ date / recorder / etc details have been completed, the species recorded can be simply checked off a list, which is identical to that used on the VC customised recording cards. So, data entry can be very quick indeed. Additional details for any of the recorded species can be added simply, such as a more detailed grid reference, determiner, status & comments.

The spreadsheet produces a list of records which can easily be checked and then converted to a format suitable for importing into MapMate by Recorders. If you would like a spreadsheet customised for your local members then please added your name to this <u>poll</u>... We will create one and send it to you.

# Use of BSBI data on the NBN Living Atlas of Scotland

As many of you will be aware, Scottish BSBI records have been free to download at full resolution<sup>1</sup> via the NBN Living Atlas of Scotland (LAS) since early 2017. This was with the permission of the VCRs affected. The records have been made available for download under a non-commercial Creative Commons license (CC-BY-NC) – this means that they can be used for non-commercial purposes with due acknowledgement (attribution) to the BSBI.

A year since being made available on LAS, over 18 million BSBI records have been downloaded. We scrutinised information provided by the NBN and discovered that 6.4 million records appear to have been downloaded by 48 commercial companies. These range between large engineering multinationals and small ecological consultancies and although we don't know what they were used for, we strongly suspect it was for commercial purposes. Obviously, we raised this with the NBN.

Due to this, and concerns raised by other data providers, the NBN have agreed to a) make it clearer to those downloading data that there are restrictions on its use, and b) impose a £500 fine for breaching them, however, the responsibility for 'policing' this sits with the data provider. These measures were put in place last month so their effect isn't yet known.

Clearly, BSBI will be monitoring this situation and will report back when appropriate to the VCRs affected. Of course, if you have any comments or concerns about this matter, please get in touch with Kevin and Jane.

It should be noted that the NBN Atlas only covers the UK. BSBI will only ever make records available through it with the permission of the relevant VCR.

# **Scottish Recording Conference**

Two one-day conferences were held in Scotland in April. Thirty-five members enjoyed the conference based in Edinburgh on Saturday 14 April and another eighteen participated in the equivalent event 'up north' two weeks later when the programme was more or less repeated.

After a welcome by BSBI President, Chris Metherell, there were three talks on Atlas 2020; a Scottish Progress Report, one on <u>Making the most of the final two field seasons</u> and one on <u>Validation & Verification</u>. The latter two presentations will be of interest to all BSBI eNews readers.

Five Recorders each gave a five-minute VC report and Michael Philip gave a very entertaining talk on Local Groups, based on his experience in Lanarkshire with 'Team 77'. However, the highlights were two workshops on identifying Bladderworts (lead by Nick Stewart and Claudia Ferguson-Smyth) and on distinguishing Deergrass taxa (by Jeremy Roberts and Andy Amphlett). We finished off two great days with lively discussions on post 2020 BSBI projects.

# Lyme Disease

Over 3,000 cases of Lyme disease are reported in Britain each year, but the number of cases is probably far higher. Apparently, a vaccine is undergoing trials which is looking very promising but it will be at least 5 years before it becomes available according to a Times article on Monday this week.

Everyone going into the field should be aware of the danger of picking up ticks carrying Lyme disease. There is an excellent leaflet published by <u>Lyme Disease Action</u> or see the <u>NHS's advice</u>. Key Points:

- Always check for ticks as soon as you return from fieldwork
- Remove ticks as soon as possible using fine tweezers or a tick removal tool
- Learn to identify the symptoms and see your GP if you have been bitten and develop them.

**Specimens wanted** of *Brachypodium pinnatum* (Heath False-brome) and *B. rupestre* (Tor-grass); preferably fresh in a plastic bag. Details needed (GPS – possibly 10 figs.) Hopefully this will help to improve knowledge of their distributions and confirm their characters. Any suspected hybrids with *B. sylvaticum* (False Brome) would be welcome but I may need a piece with live root to grow so fertility can be checked over more than one year.
