### **New BSBI Welsh Officer**



# **Atlas 2020 Progress**

This map shows Atlas 2020 progress based on records in the BSBI DDb as at 2<sup>nd</sup> October 2018.



Of course, there are many reasons why particular areas *apparently* look less well-recorded than previously. It may not be feasible to record some areas in the same detail that were covered intensely for a Flora in the last Atlas date class (for example). In some hectads the decline in taxa will be real, and not a result of under-recording.

However, it may be that records have yet to be digitised and uploaded to the DDb – like those from the Wigtownshire Recording Week this year and I am currently looking for an experienced volunteer to help with their digitisation. (Please let me know if you might be able to help.) Or where records have been digitised, but, for whatever reason, have not been uploaded to the DDb. Renfrewshire is an example of where a large and difficult dataset awaits being uploaded.

Other apparently less well-recorded areas could simply be the result of records in MapMate waiting to be sent to the DDb. Regardless of where you are with data entry, if you are a MapMate user, NOW would be a good time to Reset Synch with the DDb and resend all your data. Andy Amphlett will update the tetrad coverage maps at the end of November and it would be good to base those maps on as full a dataset as possible.

## The problem with pearlworts

Until recently Sagina apetala included two distinct subspecies: subsp. apetala and subsp. erecta. Stace (2010) attributed these taxa to separate species: S. apetala s.s. (S. apetala subsp. apetala) and S. filicaulis (S. apetala subsp. erecta). These are quite distinct ecologically with markedly different habitat associations: S. apetala is a native of bare ground in heaths and near to the sea whereas the archaeophyte S. filicaulis is confined to anthropogenic habitats such as pavements. Despite these differences many recorders continue to record them both as an aggregate. However, Michael Braithwaite has alerted us to a problem with the way MapMate deals with S. apetala. MapMate lists four taxa within the aggregate: S. apetala, S. apetala subsp. apetala, S. apetala subsp. filicaulis and S. filicaulis. The latter three taxa are clearly synonymous with those given in Stace (2010) whereas S. apetala could be interpreted in the broad or the strict sense (sensu Stace 2010). As a consequence, it is unclear to which Stace taxon MapMate records submitted since 2010 refer.

In order to deal with this problem, we are proposing to change all DDb records of *S. apetala* that originated from MapMate after 2010 to *S. apetala* s.l. We realise that this might overturn some genuine records of *S. apetala* s.s. so we would encourage any recorders who are confident that they have recorded it to change their records to *S. apetala* subsp. *apetala* in MapMate. We will also be asking Mark Yates to change the MapMate dictionary so that *S. apetala* s.l. is available to use.

# Betula papyrifera (Paper-bark Birch)

Betula papyrifera is a scarce, perhaps overlooked, alien Birch. It has been recorded from 62 hectads (51 hectads post 1999). There are no records from Ireland. According to Stace (2010) variants planted here usually have white, extensively peeling bark, while in 'Trees of Britain & Europe' Rushforth (1999) says that cultivated clones are planted for the vivid white bark.

I have found *B. papyrifera* on two occasions, in vc96 and recently in vc57. Identifications were determined / confirmed by Hugh McAllister. In neither case did the trees have obviously peeling or especially white bark. In the first instance I thought the tree might be *Betula x aurata* (*B. pendula x pubescens*). The vc57 tree I did tentatively identify as *B. papyrifera*, but without a huge amount of confidence! So, it seems that *B. papyrifera* is rather variable in appearance. As with all Birches, identification needs to be based on the whole suite of characters. A detailed set of images and notes about the vc57 tree is available.

### **Identification resources**

A reminder that for any beginner or intermediate level recorders looking for ID help and keys to a range of plants, including grasses, rushes and aquatics, <u>Ken's Keys</u> are available to access free of charge on the BSBI website. As the eponymous Ken is <u>County Recorder for Essex</u>, his keys have a distinct south-eastern bias but they are well worth a look even if you are based further north. They are illustrated by some very helpful line drawings or photographs.

Another helpful ID resource is <u>Makaques</u>, Chris Dixon's Pictorial Guide to the Flora of the British Isles, which is fairly comprehensive and is arranged in taxonomic order. Chris is also County Recorder for East Gloucestershire but, as the name suggests, his Pictorial Guide is suitable for recorders from across Britain and Ireland.

### Referees

One of the BSBI's greatest strengths is its panel of Referees whom we encourage <u>members</u> to consult whenever there is any doubt about an identification. Currently we have 107 Referees, covering nearly 200 taxonomic and non-taxonomic categories. The Referees are all volunteers and include national and international experts in their fields. Most of the authors of the <u>BSBI Handbooks</u> and contributors to the Plant Crib (available on the <u>Identification page</u> of the BSBI website) are current or past BSBI Referees. We are very grateful to them for helping members and - ultimately - helping to maintain the quality of the Society's data.

Most of the 'difficult' groups are covered, although new recruits are always welcome to ensure continuity. There has recently been considerable progress with *Hieracium*, one of our most problematic genera for which there has been an 'embarrassing' vacancy for several years.

There are currently vacancies for the following genera: *Polygala, Oenothera, Galium, Verbascum, Solidago* and *Hedera*; and to ensure continuity we would like to recruit new Referees for: *Ulex, Erodium, Circaea, Stellaria, Cerastium, Veronica hederifolia* agg., *Galeopsis tetrahit* agg. and *Juncus bulbosus* agg. Any offers or suggestions will be gratefully received!
