



## Northern Irelands Top 10



**Daisy** A familiar white and yellow flower found in lawns and grassy places.

Similar flowers: Feverfew, **Mexican Fleabane** 



**Groundsel** 

Yellow flowers, sometimes in a cluster, with no petals. Leaves jagged. Weedy places and pavements.



**Hogweed** 

Big divided leaves, hairy stems, white umbrellashaped or cauliflower-like flowers.



**Hairy Bitter-cress** 

Clusters of tiny white fourpetalled flowers (with four stamens) and upright seedpods.



**Smooth Sow-thistle** 

A dandelion look-alike but usually much taller and the stem leaves have pointy bases which wrap around the stem.



Gorse

Yellow flowers that smell of coconut when in the sun. Has the classic flower shape of a member of the pea family.



**Dandelion** 

A yellow flower with jagged leaves found in lawns, grassy places and flowerbeds. There are over 200 species of dandelion in Britian and Ireland.



**Brambles** 

Five-petalled pink or white flowers. Watch out for the thorns!



**Annual Meadow Grass** 

A tiny grass found on pavements, gravel, bases of lampposts etc., We recommend you submit a photo of this one!



**Shepherd's-purse** 

A cluster of small white flowers, each with four petals; its most distinctive feature are its heart-shaped seed pods.
