

Oblong-leaved Sundew is an insectivorous perennial growing on bare exposed peat in spongy bogs and wet acid heaths. It is often found with Round-leaved Sundew but is less common and tends to favour wetter places. In Britain it has a northerly and westerly distribution but is declining as a result of land reclamation, drainage and peat extraction. Surrey records are now confined to the heathlands to the west of the county but it can be locally plentiful in suitable sites. Lousley refers to small colonies on Reigate Heath and Wimbledon Common, but the recent records on the latter could be due to introductions. Reports from Thursley NNR indicate that conservation methods such as scrapes can be effective in creating new populations.

www.summerfieldbooks.com www.surreywildlifetrust.org/shop Surrey has a wide variety of soils and habitats supporting a richly diverse flora. There is still a good proportion of rare and scarce plants but many are in steep decline.

The **Surrey Rare Plant Registe**r is the first published work on the flora of Surrey, Watsonian vice-county 17, for over 35 years. It provides details on the status and distribution of Britain's rare, scarce and threatened plants that occur in VC17 and includes species that may be widespread elsewhere but are at risk in the county.

Written by Ann Sankey former BSBI Vice-county Recorder for VC17 and other members of Surrey Botanical Society, this publication forms part of the Surrey Wildlife Atlas Series. It has been compiled in collaboration with Surrey Wildlife Trust and Surrey Biological Information Centre.

Taxa have been identified according to strict criteria of national, regional and local rarity and threat. Also included are plants of international importance and those listed under Section 41 of the 2006 Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act and Schedule 8 of the Wildlife & Countryside Act. The status of each species is given with a description, a distribution map and/or a table showing site names and grid references of where they have been recorded. Appendices provide summary species lists using both scientific and common names making this book readily accessible to a range of users. There is a table showing all species listed on the Surrey Rare Plant Register.

The format is a softcover A4 book with 288 pages and 16 colour plates including 87 high quality colour images of plant species photographed at Surrey locations. There is information on over 400 taxa. Introductory sections provide context for this rare plant register, explanations of the species selection criteria and an introduction to habitats and conservation priorities in Surrey.

This book is intended to be of interest to statutory agencies, conservation organisations, landowners and site managers, ecological consultants, planners and professional and amateur botanists.
