New Year Plant Hunt

BSBI's seventh New Year Plant Hunt (NYPH) was a huge success and we'd like to thank all of you who contributed records, led group Hunts and shared photographs via social media. BSBI Head of Science, Kevin Walker has cleaned up the data and you can now see the final results on the <u>Results page</u> of our <u>New Year Plant Hunt website</u>. You can download Kevin's analysis of NYPH data on the <u>New Year Plant Hunt</u> webpage, where you will also find a link to NYPH coverage on BBC Countryfile.

A few stats for you taken from Kevin's analysis:

- A total of 9,907 records were received of plants in bloom across Britain and Ireland.
- 532 different species were recorded, compared to 492 last year and 611 in 2016.
- 612 lists were submitted, compared to 460 in 2017.
- The most floriferous place in Britain was Phillack in Cornwall with 114 taxa in bloom; the most floriferous place in Ireland was Irishtown/Ringsend near Dublin with 58 taxa in bloom.

Atlas 2020 Validation

Many of you have completed your 2017 data entry – well done! That gives you the perfect opportunity over the long dark evenings and wet days before the 2018 recording season to begin to tackle validation. The sooner you start the better. And the easiest place to start is with the recording cards you have just digitised. There is some helpful guidance on doing that <u>here</u> and more general guidance <u>here</u>. If you need a helping hand, <u>Andy Amphlett</u> would be pleased to help you get started.

Validating & Verification of critical species records

The identifications of records in the *Hieracium* and *Taraxacum* databases on the DDb have been critically checked. For example, David McCosh has checked or accepted all the record identifications the 'Hieracium David McCosh' dataset. So, the record identifications are *verified*. But there may still be errors in site name / grid ref / VC combinations, especially of historic records. And these records will appear in the *Records to target for validation* section under the My County / Data Validation tab.

So, Recorders, with their good local knowledge could usefully check and correct these elements of the records (i.e. *validate* them) and we would be delighted if Recorders would do that. However, as many will not be mapped in the online atlas, this **should only** be tackled once you are fully up to date with Atlas 2020 validation generally. If you do make a start on this, note that identifications should never be altered without consulting the Referee. Also, when there are apparent errors with geo-referencing (mostly grid ref typos which are correctable) it's usually OK to edit with evidence and with an explanation, but place names are best left unchanged.

New Atlas (Atlas 2000) Mastercards

CEH has scanned copies of the *New Atlas* hectad mastercards. These have recently been re-organised by our new Data Analyst apprentice, Mark Logie, and are now indexed by vice-county, making it much easier for these to be sent out to Recorders. Please contact Dr Oli Pescott (<u>oliver.pescott@ceh.ac.uk</u>) for copies. A download link will then be sent by email.

CEH also have copies of detailed Juniper cards for England (from an historic project managed by Dr Lena K. Ward), and scans of pink species cards. We cannot provide VC-specific sets of pink species cards (they are organised by species across numerous PDFs), but we can send out those PDFs that relate to a certain species. However, I cannot respond to requests for large numbers of species: please limit your requests to one or two species at a time. The other option is for me to send you the entirety of the scanned pink card archive, which will be an 8 GB download!

New BRC/BSBI Plant Recording Card on iRecord

Over recent months BRC have been working with the BSBI to bring a 'square bashing' data input mode to iRecord. The results of this can be found at <u>www.brc.ac.uk/irecord/enter-vascular-plants</u> (login or register first on <u>iRecord</u>) and a <u>poster</u> giving an overview.

This input mode enables you to enter lists of species at either monad or tetrad levels, enter finer-scale grid references for unusual finds, and also collects visit information, such as the number of recorders and the time spent recording. We hope that such 'metadata' about recorders' visits will provide an indication of recording effort that can be incorporated into future analyses.

Other enhancements to the iRecord interface include the ability to specify the vice-county when recording a 'straddling' square, the presence of vice-county boundaries on the map when selecting a square, and the ability to enter 'visit'-level notes about the recording session.

Additional information can be entered including life-stage, status (i.e. planted, invasive etc.), standard measures of local abundance (e.g. DAFOR or counts), determiner names, altitude, comments, and there is even an option to add a photo! The entry of names uses the standard iRecord auto-complete, allowing for the use of many forms of name abbreviations, including the popular strategy of typing just the first few letters of the genus and the specific epithet.

A final review screen provides the list of species, all additional information entered, and the vicecounty boundary, thus allowing one to check that any finer-scale records entered are in the right place. Try it out this spring and send us any comments or bug reports!

Could you be a Referee?

A poster exhibited at the BSBI Annual Exhibition Meeting in November (and now <u>available to download</u> <u>here</u>) sought new taxon referees. It asked:

- do you have a special interest in a particular group of plants?

- do you want to share your enthusiasm and knowledge with others?

Some current vacancies in the referee network include: hawkweeds (*Hieracium*), sea-lavenders (*Limonium*), glassworts (*Salicornia*), evening-primroses (*Oenothera*), bedstraws (*Galium*), mulleins (*Verbascum*) and hogweeds (*Heracleum*). But we are also looking for people to assist existing referees, and people who might like to form or join 'study groups'.

Garden plants: a threat to the natural environment due to climate change?

I have recently started a PhD at the University of Reading titled 'Garden plants: a threat to the natural environment due to climate change?' This project is supervised by Dr Alastair Culham and Dr Brian Pickles at the University and by Dr Eleanor Webster at the RHS. I am interested in garden plants which are showing early signs of naturalising - or invasive potential - in the natural environment. A few of you discussed the project with me at the recent BSBI Exhibition Meeting

If you are a BSBI vice-county recorder, you are invited to complete a survey. This will gather information on which garden plants you perceive to be a future threat to the natural environment in your VC. It can be completed in 5-15 minutes and can be accessed on the Culham Research Group blog <u>here</u> from **February 1st**. It will be open until the end of March. If you would prefer to complete a hard-copy version, please email me with your address. If recording duties are shared for your VC, both/ all County Recorders are welcome to complete the survey.

The data from the survey will inform subsequent elements of the PhD, including a citizen science initiative. This will give the wider BSBI membership an opportunity to engage with this project. The results from the survey will be made available at the next BSBI <u>Exhibition Meeting</u>. If you have any questions, please email me.
