# British & Irish Botany: issue 4.1 published

The <u>February 2022 issue</u> of *British & Irish Botany*, BSBI's online, Open Access scientific journal, features six papers: Ivor Rees describes a <u>new subspecies within the *Limonium binervosum* aggregate</u> from an Anglesey saltmarsh; Richard Lansdown *et al.* report on <u>two species of *Wolffia* new to Britain</u>; there are two papers by Mike Wilcox - one on <u>Scentless Mayweed</u> and one on <u>Sea Couch and coastal hybrid couch grasses in Scotland</u>; David Trudgill mined the BSBI Distribution Database for records of <u>20</u> species of orchid recorded in Scotland since <u>1950</u> to analyse the extent of their decline; and Clive Stace reported on <u>subspecies of *Vulpia geniculata*</u>.

## **National Plant Monitoring Scheme**

With the botanical field season starting soon, this is the ideal time to join the growing ranks of NPMS surveyors and see if there is a <u>square available near you</u>. 1,923 squares have been allocated so far to 1,682 volunteers, who have already submitted 187,135 records. These records help to guide policy-makers – in 2019, NPMS data contributed to the UK's first ever volunteer-based habitat quality indicators.
