Almost 200 people have already booked for this year's British & Irish Botanical Conference, which will take place on Saturday 2nd December at the Curtis Auditorium, <u>Herschel Building</u>, <u>Newcastle University</u>. Fortunately, it's a large venue so we can fit in a few more people but, if you want to join us, do book soon!

We also have a large exhibition space so we'd encourage botanical recorders and researchers to submit a poster or other exhibit about your work - the <u>British & Irish Botanical Conference</u> is BSBI's main annual event, so it's the perfect place for you to showcase what you do during the rest of the year!

A quick reminder that the <u>programme</u> includes sessions on urban botany, on BSBI research and on plant ID resources. We will also have exhibits, posters, a workshop/demonstration by Prof John Richards (BSBI expert referee on <u>dandelions</u>), a behind-the-scenes tour of the <u>NHSN Archive</u>, a plant ID quiz and <u>Summerfield Books</u>' pop-up shop with a range of botanical books and hand-lenses. MapMate Query

Last month, I mentioned that I do most of my data analysis using the BSBI Database but find the "Browse all Records for a <1km square>" MapMate user query particularly useful when checking that I have digitised all the records in the monad, no matter what grid reference resolutions were used.

We've just uploaded another version called "Browse Records for a <1km square> in <year>" that helpfully allows you to specify the year as well as the 1km square. You can get it on the Custom queries page of the BSBI MapMate Support website. Simple installation instructions are given.
