New Recording Activities and Priorities for this Field Season

Although BSBI is planning to launch several major projects over the coming years, we recognise that many recorders are itching to get going on something now, following a hiatus after the end of fieldwork for Plant Atlas 2020. To this end, a few suggestions for recording activities have been compiled.

Most require little in the way of specialist skills, methods, training or equipment and can be carried out using the BSBI Recording App. Others are more specialised and are directed toward more experienced recorders.

- The origin and regeneration of non-natives
- Under-recorded monads
- Under-recorded species
- Targeted surveys of priority species
- Target plants for beginners

New BSBI Handbook: Brambles of Scotland

Brambles of Scotland by Angus Hannah, County Recorder for Clyde Isles, has just been published. It's the 25th title in our series of <u>BSBI Handbooks</u> for difficult plants and provides comprehensive accounts of 56 *Rubus* species resident in Scotland, each one accompanied by a distribution map and a gallery of colour photographs showing diagnostic characters. An Appendix covers another 30 rare or doubtful (mostly adventive) species. Many of the 86 species also occur elsewhere in Britain and Ireland.

The <u>Brambles of Scotland webpage</u> has more information, with a sample spread (for *R. vestitus*) and details of how to get hold of a copy of the Handbook, including how BSBI members can claim a hefty discount, paying £13 (excl. P&P) compared to the RRP of £20. The webpage also has a link to a full-length, illustrated <u>interview with Angus</u> about the new Handbook, the recorders who inspired and contributed to it, and how you can get involved in Angus's ongoing bramble recording project.

Scottish HectAd Rare Plant Project - call for data

Scottish Local Nature Conservation Site boundaries now searchable on the DDb

Thanks to our Database Officer Tom Humphrey, all Local Nature Conservation Sites (LNCSs), also referred to as Local Wildlife Sites (LWSs), in Scotland are now searchable in the DDb, using the 'bounded area' search option.

To do this, enter the name of the site in the 'bounded area' search box, select the appropriate site from the dropdown that appears, and click the 'display results' button. See this example search for Thornhill North Common LNCS. To return all potentially valid records select 'include intersections' from the dropdown box to the right - this will return monad and tetrad records that intersect with the site boundary. Selecting 'contained within' will only return records made at a resolution that is completely contained within the site boundary, typically those with a six, eight or ten figure grid reference.

Do you grow any unusual, rare or difficult to identify native plants?

BSBI's <u>FISC</u> assessments have expanded across England, into Scotland this year, and there is also a trial happening in Ireland this summer. As a result, over 30 FISCs will be run this year and each FISC requires a number of specimens for the lab tests. These specimens need to challenge the candidates, so we are always in need of help from collectors and growers around the UK and Ireland to provide unusual, rare or difficult to identify native plants. If you grow any native plants in your garden and are willing to provide some specimens for the FISC tests in the post, between June and August, please contact me to find out more.
