Atlas 2020 Progress

The good news is that 75 vice counties have each sent more than 500 records to the BSBI DDb for 2018. (And amazingly 27 of them have sent more than 5,000 records!) However, 75 Vice-counties have sent less than 500 records - or in some cases none at all!

Now I know I said data entry is best done little and often and that you should wait until the next wet day after fieldwork before entering your data. But just because it hasn't rained since April doesn't mean you should completely forget about data entry! Do try keep on top of record entry, and regularly submit the records to the DDb and validate them as soon as they arrive. All three operations are much better done 'little and often' and as soon as possible after your day in the field.

Deergrasses

The end of July and beginning of August is the perfect time to look for the three Deergrass taxa: *Trichophorum germanicum* (Common Deergrass), *T. cespitosum* (Northern Deergrass) and their hybrid *T. x foersteri* (Hybrid Deergrass). Take a look at the presentation on [Deergrass Id](#) that Jeremy Roberts and Andy Amphlett prepared for the [Scottish Recording Conference](#) in April and Jeremy's excellent one-sheet-of-A4 [Trichophorum field guide](#). (Worth printing and taking with you whenever you plan to visit potentially suitable habitat.)

Aquatics

Generally, aquatics are rather under-recorded for Atlas 2020, at least compared with the previous date-class which included the splendid Scottish Loch Survey¹. Now is a great time to look for aquatics in many lakes and ponds as water levels are low and they are more approachable. (Assuming there is any water left at all!)

There are some great resources to help you. There is Nick Stewart's online [Stonewort Key](#), the Stoneworts and Pondweeds [BSBI Handbooks](#) and the section on [Pondweeds](#) in the Plant Crib. The referees are always pleased to receive nicely presented and labelled specimens for expert determination or confirmation. BSBI members can find referees' contact details in the BSBI Yearbook.

Arable Weeds

The latter half of summer is also a good time to record arable weed species (assuming they haven't been totally frazzled). I used to recommend folk look for swede (turnip in Scotland) fields but they are getting pretty rare themselves. So, instead, look in corners of potato fields that are too awkward for machine access, or along end-rigs and gaps in fields where the crops are being grown under plastic netting. In this current heat, arable weeds may be taking refuge and thriving *under* the plastic along with the crop. Where such fields don't exist or there is little tillage, you have to be very opportunistic; stop and record whenever you see disturbed weedy ground exposed by construction or road works!

Data Entry Spreadsheets

Personal Data - Reminder

If you keep a mailing list of local botanists, or if you ever have under-18s attending meetings you run, here's some important information for you:

- BSBI now has a [Personal Data Policy](#) and a [Safeguarding Policy](#). You should download both from the [Governance page](#) on the website and read them!
- GDPR applies to charities as well as commercial companies so don't forget to check that people are happy to receive emails from you. If you are holding people's email addresses for a specific event, rather than an ongoing mailing list, don't forget that you have to delete that information within 6 months of the event taking place.
- And please remember to always use the Bcc option – even if people have agreed to be on your mailing list so you can keep them updated about botany in their area, they may not want everybody else on your mailing list to see their address! So please always use the "Bcc" option.
