Atlas 2020 Data Entry



So far 1.03 million 2018 records have been added to the BSBI DDb with tetrad or better resolution by 147 VCs. An amazing achievement! But of these, 24 VCs forwarded fewer than 100 records. And 7 have yet to forward *any*! So, it would be great if you'd make a real push to get your backlog of records digitised and sent through to the BSBI Database by the end of December if possible.

Atlas 2020 Coverage Maps

Andy Amphlett has just refreshed the very popular tetrad/monad coverage maps by VC for GB and for Ireland, using the latest data available on the BSBI Distribution Database (DDb). The Maps are in the same Google Drive folders as previously – so if you have saved the address as a favourite just click on the link. Atlas 2020 Validation

If you are already fully up to date with your data entry – well done! You must **now** get on with data validation – especially if you have yet to make a start. We realise that this may be a bit daunting, so we have produced <u>simple validation guidance</u> – on the <u>Atlas 2020</u> page and Andy Amphlett has offered to help individual recorders get started. Historic plant records

How many pre-2000 plant records exist on paper, but were never submitted to Atlas 2000 and are not in the BSBI database (DDb)? Especially for vice-counties that submitted records to Atlas 2000 as Master Cards, or have not made a concerted effort to digitise the backlog, the number may be substantial. While VCRs should prioritise new fieldwork and entering, submitting and validating post 1999 records, IF you are up to date with these tasks, maybe take a look at those older records? The next Atlas, like the second, will analyse change in distribution, and change cannot be analysed without the old records to make comparisons against.

A summary of recent work to digitise the backlog of vc96 records is available here.

New Year Plant Hunt

Records, once verified, will appear on our <u>New Year Plant Hunt website</u>, where there is an interactive map. BSBI Scottish Botanists' Conference

We have a tremendous number at this year's Scottish meeting at RBGE. 175 - the biggest number of botanists to EVER meet up in Scotland! We might have had more but closed bookings early for fear of the venue not being able to cope. Apologies to those who were unable to book. If you missed it – the presentations and exhibition abstracts are already on the <u>Scottish Botanists' Conference</u> webpage and we will shortly upload images of many of the exhibits and posters – to create a virtual exhibition. The highlight of the day for many were the mini-workshops. 140 botanists participated in seven miniworkshops – each run twice and each attended by twenty – a logistical nightmare but probably one of the biggest mass training events held in the BSBI! The workshops included Introductions to Conifers, Horsetails, Grasses, The Vegetative Key, The BSBI Database and separating English, Sessile and hybrid Oaks.
